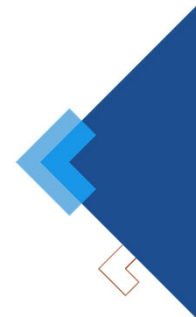

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QUALITATIVE ASPECTS OF ACCOUNTING PRACTICES (CONTINUED)

ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES

Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. The most sensitive estimates affecting the financial statements were:

- Management's estimate of depreciable lives of property and equipment used to calculate depreciation is based on the assets' estimated useful lives.
- Management's estimate of the net pension assets, liabilities and other post-employment benefits obligations (and their related deferred outflows and inflows) in continuing compliance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statements No. 68 and No. 75

We evaluated the key factors and assumptions used to develop the estimates in determining that they are reasonable in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

DISCLOSURES

The disclosures to the financial statements are neutral, consistent and clear. Certain financial statement disclosures are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the users of the financial statements. The most sensitive disclosures affecting the financial statements are:

- Deposits and investments in Note 3
- Long-term obligations in Note 6
- Retirement obligations in Note 9
- Commitments and contingencies in Note 11



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CORRECTED AND UNCORRECTED MISSTATEMENTS

Professional standards require us to accumulate all misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Further, professional standards require us to also communicate the effect of uncorrected misstatements related to prior periods on the relevant classes of transactions, account balances or disclosures, and the financial statements as a whole. The schedule attached as Appendix A summarizes uncorrected misstatements, including disclosures, of the financial statements. Management has determined these uncorrected misstatements are not material, both individually and in the aggregate, to the applicable reporting units of the financial statements. Uncorrected misstatements or matters underlying those uncorrected misstatements could potentially cause future-period financial statements to be materially misstated, even though the uncorrected misstatements are immaterial to the financial statements currently under audit.

In addition, professional standards require us to communicate to you all material, corrected misstatements that were brought to the attention of management as a result of our audit procedures. The attached schedule, included as an Appendix B, identifies misstatements that we identified as a result of our audit procedures that were brought to the attention of, and corrected by, management.

No significant deficiencies or material weaknesses in internal control over financial reporting or compliance findings were identified as a result of these procedures.



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OTHER INFORMATION INCLUDED IN ANNUAL REPORTS

Pursuant to professional standards, our responsibility as auditors for other information, whether financial or nonfinancial, included in annual reports, does not extend beyond the information identified in the audit report, and we are not required to perform any procedures to corroborate such other information. However, in accordance with such standards, we have read the information and considered whether such information, or the manner of its presentation, was materially inconsistent with its presentation in the financial statements. Our responsibility also includes communicating to you any information which we believe is a material misstatement of fact. Nothing came to our attention that caused us to believe that such information, or its manner of presentation, is materially inconsistent with the information, or manner of its presentation, appearing in the financial statements.



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SINGLE AUDIT

During the year ended December 31, 2025, the City expended greater than \$1,000,000 of federal awards. Accordingly, we performed a single audit pursuant to the audit requirements of the Uniform Guidance.

COMMENTS

The federal program selected as a major program during the single audit was:

- Congressionally Mandated Projects (66.202)
- We identified no reportable control deficiencies or compliance findings during the completion of the single audit.



Financial Reporting Changes

GASB STATEMENT NO. 103: *Financial Reporting Model Improvements*

Effective for periods beginning after June 15, 2025 (City's 2026 financial statement and audit).

The objective of this Statement is to improve key components of the financial reporting model to enhance its effectiveness in providing information that is essential for decision making and assessing a government's accountability. This Statement also addresses certain application issues.

Certain aspects of this standard will impact the City's financial reporting; the following are a few highlights of these changes:

- **MD&A Refocus:** The standard requires clearer analysis of why results changed, reduces boilerplate language and duplication, and improves accessibility for non-experts. The standard mandates that certain balances and transactions are compared and analyzed by management in a new five-section structure.
- **Operating and Non-Operating Definitions:** The standard clarifies certain reporting on the income statement and cash flows for operating vs. non-operating activities to enhance comparability between governments. Additionally, it introduces the concept of a subsidy, which would be a new financial line item for the City's proprietary funds.
- **Elimination of Extraordinary and Special Items:** These items, which required significant judgement to determine if they were applicable, are now replaced with one category of unusual or infrequent items, makes it easier to determine if the government has incurred an unusual or infrequent item.

This representation letter is provided in connection with your audit of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, the aggregate discretely presented component units, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the City of Brighton, Colorado (the City) as of December 31, 2025 and for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements, for the purpose of expressing opinions on whether the basic financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position, results of operations, and cash flows, where applicable, of the various opinion units of the City in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted for governments in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP).

We understand we are responsible for management decisions and functions, for designating a qualified employee to oversee any nonattest services you provide, for evaluating the adequacy and results of the services performed and accepting responsibility for such services.

Certain representations in this letter are described as being limited to matters that are material. Misstatements, including omissions, are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

We confirm that, to the best of our knowledge and belief, as of the date of this letter, the following representations made to you during your audit:

Financial Statements

- 1) We have fulfilled our responsibilities, as set out in the terms of the audit engagement letter for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements of the various opinion units referred to above in accordance with U.S. GAAP.

- 13) All net position components and fund balance classifications have been properly reported.
- 14) All revenues within the statement of activities have been properly classified as program revenues, general revenues, contributions to term or permanent endowments, or contributions to permanent fund principal.
- 15) All expenses have been properly classified in or allocated to functions and programs in the statement of activities, and allocations, if any, have been made on a reasonable basis.
- 16) All interfund and intra-entity transactions and balances have been properly classified and reported.
- 17) Special items and extraordinary items have been properly classified and reported.
- 18) Deposit and investment risks have been properly and fully disclosed.
- 19) Capital assets, including infrastructure assets, are properly capitalized, reported, and if applicable, depreciated.
- 20) All required supplementary information (RSI) (management's discussion and analysis, budgetary comparison information, the schedule of the City's proportionate share of the net pension liability (asset) and the schedule of the City's contributions to the pension plan and related ratios) is measured and presented within the prescribed guidelines.
- 21) With respect to the required supplementary information) accompanying the financial statements:
 - a. We acknowledge our responsibility for the presentation of the required supplementary information in accordance with *U.S. GAAP*.
 - b. We believe the required supplementary information, including its form and content, is measured and fairly presented in accordance with *U.S. GAAP*.
 - c. The methods of measurement or presentation have not changed from those used in the prior period.
 - d. We believe the significant assumptions or interpretations underlying the measurement or presentation of the required supplementary information and the basis for our assumptions and interpretations, are reasonable and appropriate in the circumstances.

- 24) Nonexchange and exchange financial guarantees, either written or oral, under which it is more likely than not that a liability exists have been properly recorded, or if we are obligated in any manner, are disclosed.

 - a. A written acknowledgement of all the documents that we expect to issue that will be included in the annual report and the planned timing and method of issuance of that annual report;
 - b. A final version of the annual report (including all the documents that, together, comprise the annual report) in a timely manner prior to the date of the auditors' report.
- 51) The financial statements and any other information included in the annual report are consistent with one another, and the other information does not contain any material misstatements.
- 52) All assumptions and determinations made by the City in relation to the implementation of GASB Statement No. 87, *Leases*, and No. 96, *Subscription-Based Information Technology Arrangements*, are consistent and reasonable within the requirements of the standard, especially those assumptions related to the County's estimated incremental borrowing rate, and any elections related to the length or period of those leases.
- 53) We agree with the findings of specialists in evaluating the self-insurance/IBNR and have adequately considered the qualifications of the specialist in determining the amounts and disclosures used in the financial statements and underlying accounting records. We did not give or cause any instructions to be given to specialists with respect to the values or amounts derived in an attempt to bias their work, and we are not otherwise aware of any matters that have had an effect on the independence or objectivity of the specialists.
